



## Hutton All Saints' Primary School Sports' Premium Funding 2016-2017



In April 2013 the Government announced £150 million worth of school funding for Physical Education (PE) and sport as part of the 'Olympic Legacy'. It is intended that the funding be used to improve the quality of PE and sport provision in all state schools.

Hutton All Saints' School was allocated £8900 in 2015/16 and 2016/17, which in accordance with the guidance, we will be channelling directly into developing the provision of sport and PE throughout the school.

### The aims for the investment at Hutton All Saints' are:

- To increase the breadth and quality of the PE curriculum in all classes.
- To improve the teaching of PE beyond 2017.
- To increase participation of all children in physical activity and increase the profile of sport and Physical activity throughout the school.
- To increase the opportunities for pupils to compete in sports within school and between other schools.

### In order to meet these aims we will use the Sports' Premium Funding in 2016/17 to:

Employ a specialist sports' coach, Mr Oaks, to work across the school, team teaching P.E. lessons.

- Mr Oaks will work weekly with the EYFS and Key Stage 1 teachers. He delivers lessons in multi-skills, gymnastics and athletics skills which he plans and assesses. Mr Oaks will work closely with the class teachers who teach fortnightly under his guidance and support.
- In addition, Mr Oaks will work with Year 5 pupils. In these lessons he supports the class teacher in planning, delivering and assessing PE lessons.
- Mr Oaks will also support Play Leaders on a Friday lunchtime to introduce new games which the leaders can play with KS1 children during their lunch break.

Work with additional specialist sports coaches

- A football coach will work alongside the Year 3 & 4 class teacher in the Autumn Term. These lessons will teach children some of the basic skills for football which can also be transferred across different sports. The Year 3 & 4 teachers will complete a coaching qualification alongside these lessons.

**Impact: PE teaching and learning is improved across the school**

**Cost : £ 4561**

Subsidise a range of extra-curriculum sports clubs

- P.E. funding has been used to ensure the cost of P.E. clubs, which run outside the school day, are affordable for parents. This will continue this academic year.
- The range of clubs on offer has been significantly increased since the introduction of the Sports Premium, ensuring that more children are able to participate in PE outside of the school timetable.
- These subsidised clubs include: Y1 & 2 Football, Y3 & 4 Football, Y5 & 6 Football, Junior Girls' Football, Cheerleading, Street Dance, Hockey, Dodgeball and Athletics.

Enter competitions, tournaments and sporting events

- Children will be able to attend district competitions such as netball, cross country and the district triathlon as well as events run by local secondary schools.
- The Sports' Premium money will pay for members of staff to be given time to organise and attend these events with a team of pupils.

**Impact: The profile of PE is raised within the school and local community. More opportunities for enriched learning.**

**Cost : £2900**

Teach PE lessons throughout the year in a larger indoor space

- The local community centre will be hired out throughout the week in the afternoons. This allows children in Years 2- 6 to take part in PE lessons with more space. It also ensures that longer, regular PE lessons can take place throughout the year. The school hall is then used predominantly for PE lessons in the morning and by EYFS and junior classes.

**Intended Impact: PE teaching and learning is improved across the school.**

**Cost: £1000 (£500 fundraised)**

Buy new equipment for PE lessons, clubs and events such as sports day.

Including: football goals, balls, sand pit refurbishment and cover (for athletics)

**Intended impact: PE provision is improved across the school**

**Cost: £500**

### **The impact of this funding will be measured through:**

- Direct feedback by teachers on the quality of support offered by specialist teachers in school.
- Lesson observations and climate walks to measure the effectiveness of the teaching of PE.
- The increase in the number of children engaging in school sporting activities either at after schools clubs or outside school.
- The increase in the number of children participating in inter-school competitions.
- The increase in the number of children who have responsibility for sporting events taking place in school, e.g. play-leaders, team captains, PE monitors etc.

## **Sports' Premium Funding 2015-2016**

### Expenditure

- **£2220.50**  
Subsidised extra curriculum PE clubs with specialist coaches – football, cheerleading, table tennis, girls' football, hockey, tag rugby & athletics  
**Impact: The profile of PE is raised within the school community.**
- **£ 64.98**  
New equipment bought for PE lessons, clubs and school based events including balls, nets, athletic equipment and multi-skills equipment.  
**Impact: The profile of PE raised within the school community.  
PE teaching and learning improved across the school.**
- **£4680.00**  
Specialist coaches team-taught PE lessons throughout the year in all year groups. These include: basketball coach working with Year 3, a cricket coach working in Year 4, a dodgeball coach working with Year 6 and Foundation Sports delivering lessons throughout the year to KS1, Year 5 and Year 6.  
**Impact: PE teaching and learning improved across the school.**
- **£968.75**  
Local community centre is hired out for a larger indoor area to teach PE effectively.  
**Impact: PE teaching and learning improved across the school.**

**£777.13**

- Expenses for taking teams to matches which take place during the school day, e.g. events at local secondary schools, county basketball tournament, etc.

**Impact: The profile of PE raised within the school and local community.**

#### Results from 2015-2016

- School was awarded a Gold Sainsbury's Award for the number of children participating in extra curriculum clubs, the number of sporting events attended and the participation of children leading and being involved in sporting events.
- 17 sporting clubs were available across the school throughout the year including: table tennis, netball, football, girls' football, hockey, multi-skills, athletics, basketball and cheerleading, tag rugby and dance.
- The school entered into 26 inter-schools matches, competitions and tournaments.
- Links with local sports clubs such as Warwick Cheerleading and Kazen Kai Martial Arts were made stronger with displays in assemblies and at Sports Day.
- The school continued links with the local community by using the community centre for PE lessons.
- The school successfully hosted the District Sports' Athletics Competition for all middle schools in the area.
- A successful sports day was held which involved all staff in the school. Year 6 were 'team leaders' for mixed age teams.
- Play Leaders was run with great success by the Year sixes with the support of Mrs Bennett, Mrs Sewell and Mr Oaks. Children in Key Stage 1 were able to participate with structured PE activities during lunchtime.

#### Results from 2014-2015

- School was awarded a Gold Sainsbury's Award for the number of children participating in extra curriculum clubs, the number of sporting events attended and the participation of children leading and being involved in sporting events.
- 15 sporting clubs were available across the school throughout the year including: table tennis, netball, football, girls' football, hockey, multi-skills, athletics, basketball and cheerleading.
- The school entered into 42 inter-schools matches, competitions and tournaments.
- Links with local sports clubs such as Warwick Cheerleading and Kazen Kai Martial Arts were made stronger with displays at the Summer Fun Day and Sports Day.
- The school hosted and won the District Sports' Athletics Competition and featured in the local media.
- The Year 4 Basketball team won the Champions Academy League (competing against local schools).
- The Year 6 Basketball team won the Champions Academy League and the Essex Winter Games (competing against the best schools from all districts in the county). This featured in the local press as well as individual achievements of pupils who played for East of England.
- A sports newsletter was created to celebrate the achievements in sport in and out of school.
- The school continued links with the local community by using the community centre for PE lessons.
